

"COME OVER TO MACEDONIA AND HELP US!"

AS I READ ACTS 16, I REALISE THIS CALL IN A VISION TO PAUL WAS VERY CLEAR; SO UNEQUIVOCAL THAT HE INSTANTLY PREPARED TO GO, FIRMLY 'CONCLUDING THAT GOD HAD CALLED US TO PREACH THE GOSPEL' THERE. (V 10)

I find this part of the biblical account of Paul's life fascinating. What a man of God Paul became. A fearless preacher, teacher and evangelist. His knowledge, steeped in the Tora, enabled him to foot it theologically with the best of Jewish leaders and scholars. And that was what drove his practice of heading straight to the local synagogue whenever he headed into a new town. Paul had his methodology down pat. Here was a proven formula, ordained by God Himself it appeared.

If it seemed obvious doing things this way brought God's blessing, why would you not persist with it? To Paul this seemed to be the best method to have the greatest impact for God, so why would he not continue with it? I like no-brainers too! I can relate to Paul and his thinking. I would like to think I would take a similar approach. There's a comfortable level of certainty through control over methods and results. After all, isn't that the sort of thinking we've all adopted in some shape at some

time in our ministries for God? Paul witnessed "the churches strengthened in their faith and growing daily in numbers". (v 5) Wasn't that what it was all about?! Wasn't that the reason for being?

Let's note that the Holy Spirit prevented Paul and his companions from preaching in the province of Asia. The Spirit also blocked them from entering the adjoining town of Bithynia in Mysia. Then came the vision, containing the welcoming 'call' to Macedonia. He immediately made tracks for Philippi at the heart of that province. I love Paul's obedience we see here. Don't you? He didn't hesitate for a moment, it seems.

There can't have been ten Jewish men in Philippi, the requirement for the establishment of a synagogue. Paul couldn't head to the 'local' to establish his connections and to implement his 'winning formula'. There wasn't one! Seeking fellowship and an ability to connect with like-minded people, Paul and his companions instead head outside the city to where they expect people to be praying. And there, by the river, they find women, one of whom is Lydia, 'a worshipper of God'. Instead of meeting with an august group of male theologians, here Paul focusses on one god-fearing lady.

Talk about being thrown a curve ball! What had happened to the way in which things always worked, with the blessing of God? What is going on here? And what can we learn?

Enter Covid-19. Here comes the curve ball for us!

For us at GC3 it has caused us to rejig some of how we do things. The biggest negative impact has been on our 2020 Headspace team. The initial lockdown came just at the time the team was to embark on their work block, earning funds to pay their fees. Sadly, C-19 meant the team had to return to their homes. With international travel suspended, the

usual Block Four in Thailand for cultural immersion was no longer possible. When the team was able to assemble again and resume the programme, they instead completed a NZ Road Trip. This enabled them to connect with groups to be exposed to cross-cultural influences and to provide human resource help to various ministries. It's been a totally different year for the team, but one in which they have still been able to experience God at work around them. They will all be the richer of God as a consequence as well.

And for our mission partners, what a raft of dilemmas they have been faced with! Each has faced unique circumstances around safety in-country; their ability to travel either to NZ or back to their chosen ministry; the needs of family; even the considered instructions from sending church or mission agency. It's been a privilege to journey with partners during these uncertain times.

In March when C-19 struck, 69% of our people on the field chose to remain there. Since then, for a variety of reasons, others have returned home and others are due. Some have had to defer their plans to return indefinitely. On the flip side, three couples have chosen to return, to Fiji, Laos and South Sudan, travelling to their 'Macedonia' despite the challenges and personal risks.

There's a raft of commentary that has been published around the probable changes to mission as a result of the global pandemic. Inevitably there will be many impacts, and already I've seen a powerful example of what I believe God has in mind for us to consider.

Our Government has responded to the needs of refugees, settling many from Asian countries in people-group communities within our cities. A young lady had responded to God's clear call to go 'over there' to a particular people group before C-19 became an issue for us all. Plans were at an advanced stage for her to go. But God had other ideas, providing her with remarkable evidence that she was to work among the growing number of refugees from that same country settling into a new life in a NZ city.

While God's calling and grip on our hearts to engage in His mission never changes, let's all expect and wonder at what God might have us do in order to achieve that! As the well-worn cliché puts it, "We can't put God in a box." He will enable us to achieve great things for Him, no matter what; Covid-19 or not.

After all, consider how Paul changed his method in a situation beyond his control. And maybe, just maybe, our 'Macedonia' is right on our back door step!

LIES AND DEATH

AT BRIGHT HOPE WORLD WE ENCOURAGE PEOPLE TO BECOME RELIANT ON GOD AND TO STRIVE TO BE ECONOMICALLY SELF-SUSTAINING. HOWEVER, WE CONSTANTLY RUN INTO WORLDVIEWS THAT TRAP PEOPLE IN POVERTY.

Despite the fact that people might be sitting on fertile land, with plenty of water and an abundance of time, they can't see what they can do. The lies they have learned from their culture trap them in poverty and they don't have enough to eat! The way out for them requires confrontation of the lies and learning to think in new ways. They need a fresh perspective.

In 1 Thessalonians 1:9 and 10 we come across some striking words about just this type of radical world-view transformation.

"For they themselves report what kind of reception you gave us. They tell how you turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God, and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead—Jesus, who rescues us from the coming wrath."

One is prompted to wonder why Paul uses the adjectives "living and true" to describe God's character, and what waiting "for his Son from heaven" looks like?

Paul could have deployed many adjectives to describe God to these people. But "living and true" were the most pertinent, especially as his letter was written into a predominantly pagan culture and received by a diverse church demographic. Their world churned with ideas and diversity. You can read more about it in Acts 17.

Idolatry underpinned the majority culture of the day. Paul asserts that God is "living and true" because the ubiquitous idols are 'dead and lying'. A great contrast is cast here between God and all other gods. Embedded in this is the need for a radical decision and transformation.

As new believers, they had to grapple with the many lies embedded in their society and the culture of death and defeat that grew out of that. They had been saved from this. The rampant lies and lifestyles were being confronted by the character of this 'new God' they were discovering and the radically different world-view they were embracing.

This new and diverse community was learning all of this in a vacuum created by at least three factors: Paul's team was only there for a few weeks before they were forced to flee; they were being forced to endure constant persecution, and; they were "waiting for Jesus" who would rescue them. False teaching invaded this "waiting"

and there are frequent references to this in both First and Second Thessalonians.

Challenging diversity, pagan beliefs, persecution and a vacuum of truth hardly seem like a great environment in which to survive, let alone flourish. But flourish they did, becoming a church that others sought to emulate.

It's hard to escape comparisons with our time and culture. Fake news, multiple personal 'truths', the enacting of deathproducing laws, blatant false teaching in many churches and pressure from our pagan culture have created for us a similar kind of pluralistic cauldron. How do we thrive in this environment? How do we maintain a Christian world-view? What does joy look like as we live under the pressure?

The answer from these verses comes in two parts. The first is the awareness that our primary context is not our human culture or society, whatever that might be. We're waiting for the Son from heaven, the rescuer from wrath. Our primary culture is that of a completely different world with revealed values that are confronting and radical.

The second is found in the radical nature of the turn described. We turn away from lies and death and we turn to the living and true God. This means we perceive the lies within our society and reject them. We cut the ties that drag us into believing the lies and from being drawn into death. At the same time, we see and understand the reality of God's nature and throw ourselves into his character. He becomes our source, our food, our drink, our life. And we wait, secure in him, no matter what rages around us, for however long it takes. We don't just turn away from idols, we turn towards the living and

This is, of course, entirely radical. It is a different way of viewing the world that swirls around us. That's why encouragement is so important in this book, even in the face of death.

What are the lies embedded in our culture right now? How are you building resilience and faith into your people in the face of these lies? What are you doing to instil courage into your people?

Block One began, and it was absolutely sensational. After a great time of teambuilding, the team completed the new Kairos course which solidified their biblical foundations with a mission perspective. They truly applied themselves, producing a high standard of work – we were very impressed to say the least, thinking to ourselves, 'if this is the starting point for the year, imagine where they are going to end up!' Our

plans were working, and things were really beginning to take shape, until, of course... *it* happened.

COVID-19, who could have guessed?

The last week of March brought with it breaking news all across New Zealand – that we were in the midst of a global pandemic. It is probably safe to say that there has not been an event that has affected the entire world at the same time since World War 2. With just 48-hours in hand to return to our

respective homes and begin isolating, we frantically arranged for parents to pick up their young person. Block One brought wonderful momentum and we were so keen to see how the team was going to grow as they entered into Block 2 but the rest of the year hung in limbo as we watched the news and awaited government announcements from our individual homes.

Each year Headspace can be quite a beast, but it suffices to say none of us could have predicted a pandemic to be one of the obstacles we'd encounter. In

response, we decided to innovate and take Headspace online, continuing with all content we could through a screen and worked to find ways for the team to keep building the Headspace culture. Everyone pushed through the screen fatigue and took the opportunity to develop their spiritual disciplines, becoming good stewards of leisure and free time during lockdown. We didn't know exactly when we'd be able to resume the program and return to Hoatu Kaimua for Block 3 in preparation for Block 4 and international travel was confirmed by

the government to no longer be possible, which meant we were not going overseas for the climactic cross-cultural exposure experience that Headspace is so well known for in Thailand.

However, eventually alert levels dropped. We came back together and with very little time to plan, decided to take the team on an in-country, New Zealand Road Trip. We reached out to the various contacts we had and started cold calling ministries - we faced numerous dead ends as other programs and churches' plans were flung into chaos too. It was as if we were on a moving train, laying down the tracks in front of us, praying as we went. The lodge where the team is housed for three blocks of the year is called "Hoatu Kaimua," which essentially means, "first fruits." It was at this part of the year that we truly had to give God what plans we had and trust Him to multiply opportunities. And of course, He did. Every step of the way. Accommodation options came just in time, places to serve, ministries in need, and opportunities for the team to grow in faith and confidence in our God.

The Road Trip was certainly as much a spiritual journey for us all as it was physical travel. God provided situations for the team to learn, in real life and in real time, what it means to lean and depend on Christ. The result has privileged us as a leadership to see these incredible young people of God step up to the challenge of increasing their capacity of servanthood. Despite lockdown, despite the undulating alert levels, despite the risks of regional travel and interactions with gatherings, and despite the massive upheaval of our precious plans - God had us. He always did and always will. He is so often far more interested not in what we do but in who we are, and how we do things. That is the Headspace culture.

I'm writing this update at Hoatu Kaimua, in front of a crackling fire as the night settles in, while the Headspace students quietly work hard on their reflections of the year in preparation of their final Celebration Day in a few weeks where they will be awarded certificates of completion of Headspace and of the Kairos course – mere symbols of their achievement. The intangibles they have gained are arguably immeasurable.

Lifelong Christian friendship, biblical understanding, missional worldview, cross-cultural exposure experiences, physical labour and service, leadership of youth groups and church services, visiting universities, writing music, running holiday camps - growing in wisdom and in faith, resilience, steadfastness, perseverance, kindness, patience, selfcontrol, authenticity and trust, and more - these are the treasures they take home in their kete. These young men and women of God are our next generation of servant-hearted leaders. We are humbled and blessed as a Leadership Team and full of hope from seeing what God has done in their lives this year. Join us in thanks for the work the Lord has done!
